## Pastoral Letter



My Dear Friends,

On 16<sup>th</sup> March 2020 many of us left the church building aware of the fear and apprehension caused by the Corona Virus that was rapidly spreading in our Nation and across the world. Little did we know then of the impact that this Global Pandemic would have on each of our lives, our Church and Community.

Church buildings closed, social distancing imposed, and restrictions on our freedom to visit family or friends. You may well recall the fear of touching things - even food shopping being cleaned with disinfectant on its delivery, the apprehension of meeting a neighbour on your daily walk, or standing in a queue at the Co-op.

These stringent restrictions have relaxed somewhat over the past two years but as I write we are still wearing face coverings in our church buildings and adhering to numerous social distancing regulations. One of the most significant relaxations was the lifting of the ban on congregational singing and although we all struggled to sing with a face covering on - especially as we were so out of practice - over the last few months the volume of the singing during worship has increased and been enjoyed by those participating. It has also been wonderful to have the Choir back leading our singing each week.

On 27<sup>th</sup> **March** morning worship will be a **Thanksgiving Service** in the church to reflect and remember the great work that has been done by medical researchers and NHS staff in the treatment and care of our Nation during this Pandemic. We also wish to thank the all the key workers in our own community: the shopworkers who kept our local shops open and as a result maintained access to food and other essential supplies; the teachers who have taught from their homes or in classrooms; the electricians, plumbers and other workers who kept our homes warm and safe. Within our church family it is an opportunity to thank all those who kept us connected with each other and allowed us to be a real example of a church without walls within our community and beyond. This **Thanksgiving Service** takes place on the Sunday the clocks go forward, and we hope that there will be further relaxations announced by then as we adapt our lives to live with the Virus.

I also hope that as we journey towards Easter that many of those who have not yet ventured back to church will feel able to return and feel both welcomed and safe.

I know however that this may not be possible for some and therefore we plan to keep our online streamed services which will include the Holy Week Evening Services.

One of the hymns I plan to use on the 27<sup>th</sup> of March is the Stuart Townend version of "The Lord's my Shepherd" which we sang on the Sunday before lockdown and I know for many of us the words of this hymn and particularly the chorus have brought comfort and hope in dark and difficult days:-

"And I will trust in you alone  
And I will trust in you alone  
For Your endless mercy follows me  
Your goodness will lead me home."

As a Nation, Church and individuals we face more challenges in the months ahead and more dark and difficult days but we have the knowledge and the comfort that Our God, the Good Shepherd walks with us – guiding, protecting and encouraging us.

This brings to mind another of Stuart Townend's hymns –

**In Christ Alone** my hope is found  
He is my light, my strength, my song.  
This cornerstone, this solid ground  
firm through the fiercest drought and storm.  
What heights of love, what depth of peace  
when fears are stilled, when strivings cease.  
My comforter, my all in all  
Here in the love of Christ I stand.

As we spring into Spring and move forward as a church and community may God's love be our light, strength and song. May His Peace fill our world and His Hope fill our lives. Easter is the time to celebrate New Life and new opportunities.

## Church Driveway

Due to recent “near misses” of vehicles leaving the driveway on to Ferry Road the Board were asked to see if improvements could be made to reduce the risk of an accident. The sight distance to the right of the current exit is very poor and cannot be improved without demolishing and rebuilding a section of the B listed boundary wall. The time and cost implications of this are such that alternative solutions were required. As traffic increases on the road, due at least in part to all the new housing in Bishopton, it is felt that measures need to be put in place now to try to resolve the issue.

Contact was made with Natalie Don MSP, Renfrewshire Council and Police Scotland to discuss the issue. A package of measures has now been agreed with Renfrewshire Council and approved by the Church Trustees, the implications of these being as set out in the following paragraphs.

The direction of traffic flow on the driveway will be changed such that traffic will enter from the west and leave from the east, opposite Drumcross Road. This will significantly enhance the visibility to the right on exiting. However, visibility to the left will be reduced when compared to the current west exit. In view of this it is recommended that drivers turn left on exiting and travel to the roundabout at HP before turning westbound towards Bishopton. Care will also be required if drivers wish to cross Ferry Road directly on to Drumcross Road.

Drivers parking in the driveway are asked to delay their departure after the service until most pedestrians are clear. This is to avoid conflict between vehicles and pedestrians.

As they do at present, drivers are asked to park as close to the masonry upstand kerb on the south side of the driveway as possible to ensure other vehicles can pass. A check has been made that car doors can open over this kerb. However, it is realised that drivers will require to exit on to the grass.

The Church Car Park in Drumcross Road should continue to be used as the preferred parking location for church. This is to ensure that essential users, such as those on the car run, can park in the driveway.

Renfrewshire Council will be erecting new warning signs on Ferry Road and installing rumble strips and “Slow” road markings on the carriageway on both the east and west bound approaches. They will also install “In”, “Out”, “No Entry” and “No Exit” signs at the driveway entrance/exit. This will take place at some point during the 2022/23 financial year.

Consultations are continuing with Renfrewshire Council to see if further improvements to visibility can be made, particularly in respect of the pedestrian crossing point from the Car Park. The volume of traffic and decreasing visibility from vegetation on the north side of Ferry Road is increasing the risk at this point.

The Board realise that this is a major change to what has been our practice for many years and the situation will be monitored to see if other improvements require to be made. It is planned to introduce the driveway changes on Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> April.



## One World Committee

We would like to thank all members of the church for their generosity in giving £267 to Shelter in December, the food for Christmas dinner to Foodbank and over £800 in the Jars of Grace to Unicef.

At this time we are thinking and praying for a resolution to the war in Ukraine. Anyone who would wish to make a donation to the Disasters Emergency Appeal should do so. We plan to have a formal church appeal for Ukraine shortly.

We have recommended that £568 which had been raised over the past two years for a village water project in Malawi but which is unlikely to be started until 2023 at the earliest, be donated to a hospital project in Malawi where it will be added to funds to provide care and education for maternity and childcare services. Many rural mothers still have their babies at home, with no conventional medical backup. Getting mothers and fathers from some villages to attend and access maternity services is a challenge. Many in the area are in need of material and medical assistance. Infant mortality is still high in Malawi, but the work of maternity wards like this at Ekwendeni Hospital is helping to reduce the number of fatalities.

You can see a photograph above of the cheque being given and the facilities to which it will help. Our contact in Malawi (Neil) is seen presenting the cheque to Head of Nursing Clara Wachepa alongside Dr Twizelimena (doctor in charge) and another staff member.

Finally £190 was donated at the retirement offering for our appeal for Afghanistan. We plan to make this a project extending into the year with other appeals culminating with a home envelope distribution to be returned to the church. This is planned for the early part of the summer.

## Cost Of Living Crisis– Where to Get help

If the last two years have taught us anything it's that there are few certainties in life. However, one thing we can be certain of this year is that there will be some unwelcome rises in our cost of living. At the One World Committee we've been discussing this issue and felt it could be useful to identify some sources of information that may potentially be useful not only to our congregation but also to extended family, friends and the broader community. There is a huge amount of information and support out there, often indeed more than you may imagine. Detailed below are some of the key organizations which can provide help and specialist advice.

**1. Advice Works Renfrewshire-** a free, confidential service which provides expert advice on a wide range of money and debt issues including budgeting, negotiating with creditors, bankruptcy, mortgage and rent arrears. Benefit checks are also undertaken to ensure that you are getting all the benefits to which you are entitled. **2. Renfrewshire Citizens Advice Bureau-** their trained advisers have vast experience and provide practical, independent advice on a wide range of topics including debt and money, benefits, housing, energy and work-related issues. **Full information is available at [renfrewshirecab.org.uk](http://renfrewshirecab.org.uk). **3. Renfrewshire foodbank-** provides support to anyone in Renfrewshire at a time of crisis. Nutritious food parcels are provided for 3 days to individuals and families who are in need. This is a short-term service designed to help people get back on their feet and be able to self-manage

their own situation. The foodbank also has access to specialist staff who can provide advice on maximizing income.

**4. EBI Unites** - covers the Erskine, Bishopton and Inchinnan areas and provides one-off or scheduled food parcels to those in need. The service is available to all, and no referral is required. Weekly food deliveries can be made to those suffering from social isolation. EBI also runs a community pantry at the Church of the Nazarene in Erskine which is open to everyone. The pantry receives donations of short date items from local shops thereby helping reduce food waste. In addition EBI provides befriending services for lonely residents as well as advocacy support to families struggling to interact with mainstream services.

**5. Home Energy Scotland-** is a Scottish Government initiative to help create warmer homes, reduce energy bills, and lower your carbon footprint. Energy costs will rise very significantly over this year and Home Energy Scotland want to ensure that people are not overpaying on their energy bills. They can check your eligibility for special discounts from energy suppliers and help you get a benefits and tax credit check so you're not missing out on additional income. In some cases, funding can be accessed to help your home's energy efficiency.
