## Finance

Our 2025 end of year accounts were approved by the Trustees and subsequently presented to members at the Stated Annual Meeting. I am pleased to be able to report that the accounts show a year end surplus in our General Fund of £17,319, a slight reduction from 2024 but around £10,000 better than our 2025 budget assumption. Offerings increased by around 8% and our halls continue to be used extensively by the community generating around 20% of our income. Our fundraising activities such as the Quiz Night, Summer Barbecue, Christmas Fayre and Church Concerts all helped to support the work of the church. Many thanks to all involved with these. Expenditure was in line with our budget despite the fact that, as predicted, our energy costs have doubled in the past two years.

Our Restricted Funds, which consist of various legacies and regular donations for church restoration, were also in surplus by just over £3,100. However, a recent report by the Presbytery Buildings Officer recommends various items of remedial work to our buildings. The funding and phasing of these works is still being considered but is likely to have an impact on the reserves we hold in both our General and Restricted accounts.

I would like to thank all of you not just for your continuing financial contributions to the work of the church, but more particularly in 2025 for the response we requested from many of you as we went through the Gift Aid audit with His Majesty's Revenue and Customs in the latter part of the year. Gift Aid accounts for around 13.5% of our income. Around 80% of our Gift Aid declarations were over 10 years old, with many dating from the early "noughties", and so we had anticipated the audit might highlight some issues with recovery of Gift Aid. That proved to be the case, and we are now in discussion with HMRC about the potential financial impact on the church.

Looking forward to 2026 we are budgeting for a modest surplus in our operating income and expenditure. The financial implications of the Gift Aid audit and the Presbytery Building Officer's report still cannot be assessed. However, our bank balances are healthy, and reserves have been built up over the years for such "rainy day" events.

One of our main items of expenditure is our Giving to Grow allocation from the Church of Scotland headquarters. This covers not only the cost of our own ministry but also supports the wider work of the church. Our allocation increases or decreases each year dependent on a previous year's income. For 2026 it has increased by around £12,000, a reflection of the success we have had in recovering our financial position from the impact of the Covid years. However, this increase will affect our end of year accounting position.

Finally, for the many of you who do on-line shopping can I remind you to sign up at <https://www.easyfundraising.org.uk/causes/bishopton-parish-church>. It should only take a few minutes. Our income from this in 2025 was modest but with enough supporters it should make a useful contribution to our funds.

Thank you again for your continued support to the work of the Church.

Serving for thirty years is a huge achievement for any Elder, and the fact that we were able to commend so many at the same time is astonishing, as is the fact that their combined service amounted to nine hundred and twenty-eight years.

The significance of the occasion was recognised by the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, Rt Rev Rosie Frew, who honoured us with her presence and spoke at the special service of thanksgiving. During the ceremony she revealed that one of her regular duties is to sign long service certificates for Elders throughout congregations in Scotland. However, being with us on that Sunday gave her a rare opportunity to congratulate the recipients in person and offer her

congratulations and appreciation on behalf of the Church of Scotland for the dedicated service shown by so many from one congregation.

The Moderator presented recipients with Long Service Certificates on behalf of the Church of Scotland, and Yvonne followed that with framed Communion Tokens dated 1821, only six years after the present Church building was consecrated in 1815.

Following the service in the Church, recipients, members of the congregation and the Moderator, accompanied by her husband, Peter, adjourned to The Cornerstone and were treated to teas and coffees and a fine range of sandwiches, cakes, and scones.



At The Cornerstone, the Moderator was thanked for enhancing our celebrations and was presented with flowers as well as her own commemorative Communion Token from Bishopton Parish Church.

So, a very special day in the history of our Church when so many of our elders were recognised for their long service and for some, a long overdue acknowledgement by the Church for their work. Such an event is unlikely to happen ever again as the occasion served as a notice to recognise in the future the commitment of elders as soon as they reach the thirty-year milestone.

**ADAM CONACHER**, Ministerial Candidate in Training has been with us in Bishopton since last September, sharing in and leading worship as well as participating in many of our other activities. Adam has kindly agreed to share some thoughts about himself with us.

*Adam, it has been good to have you share in, and lead, worship in Bishopton over recent months and we hope that you are enjoying your time with us. It would be good for us to know a bit more about you so here are a few questions which hopefully you are happy to respond to.*

***Where is home, and when did you come to Scotland?***

I am certainly enjoying my time at Bishopton. Everyone has been so welcoming and supportive of me and my family in my early stages of training. There is a strong sense of community in Bishopton, with the church being an integral part of this.

People sometimes find my accent hard to place. I'm from Northern Ireland, in a wee village called Killinchy. It is around 30 minutes south of Belfast, on the Western side of Strangford Lough. My parents' house is on the local farm, not far from the village.

I came to Scotland in 2014 to study. I was keen to explore somewhere new, and Scotland really appealed to me. I studied Maths at the University of Glasgow, with the intention of training to teach afterwards.

***Did you enjoy school, what were your favourite (or least favourite) subjects, and do you have any special memories?***

I enjoyed going to secondary school in Downpatrick growing up. I was a very shy pupil and remember sitting in most classes hoping that the teacher wouldn't ask me a question. Maths was by far my favourite subject, followed by Moving Image Arts (similar to film studies), which I studied in my last 2 years of school. Ironically, Religious Studies was my worst subject. I had very little interest in it at the time and felt I had little to contribute to classroom discussions.

It was during school that I first started running. However, it was out of necessity rather than interest. All boys in my school would play rugby; however, at the age of 13 I broke my neck as a result of being a little too adventurous on a mountain bike. When my PE teachers heard this, they weren't too sure what I could do instead of rugby, so suggested that I run during PE. Over the course of the year, some good friends joined me, and this became an enjoyable time exercising and chatting.

***What interests or hobbies do you have?***

I enjoy lots of different adventure sports, the main one being mountainboarding. It is a very niche sport, that I got involved in with a close friend from school. The best way to describe it would be as a snowboard with wheels, so as you can go off-road on it. More recently, I've struggled to find time for mountainboarding and I've become more risk averse as a dad, so I have tended to opt for running instead.

I typically run around Glasgow, from home, but I like to take the opportunity to get out on some trails and hills when I can. Some go-to places nearby would be the Kilpatricks, the West Highland Way and the hills around Loch Lomond. One of my main goals is running the Lairig Ghru race, going from Braemar to Aviemore through the Cairngorms, this year.

I enjoy snowboarding, film making and mountain biking when I get the chance to. I am also learning Scottish Gaelic just now, albeit very slowly.

***Do you have favourite TV programmes, and favourite food?***

Anna and I tend to watch crime dramas. With busy schedules, we probably average around an episode a week, so we often need to catch up with each other to remind ourselves what has happened in the previous episode. I also enjoy watching Father Ted and The IT Crowd, both written by Graham Linehan.

Anna and I both enjoy our food, especially when we have the chance to try different places around Glasgow. Being spoilt with so many amazing Indian restaurants nearby, Indian food would probably be my go-to at the moment.

***You were a Maths teacher before you entered Theological training. Did you always want to be a teacher, and how did you find the experience?***

I had considered physiotherapy and psychology whilst I was at school but had no set career aspirations. When it came to applying for university, I felt that I really wanted to study Maths. Since I had worked with young people, through being a young leader at Scouts, teaching seemed like a good fit for me.

After quite a tough student year whilst training to teach, I was very thankful to be placed in Hyndland Secondary school for my probationary term. I encountered some fantastic pupils and colleagues and enjoyed teaching there for 6 years. As any teacher will tell you, it is not without its pressures and challenges. However, at its best, teaching is one of the most rewarding experiences I have ever had.

***What was the motivation / inspiration for you to decide to enter the ministry?***

My calling into ministry was very gradual. It is now around 8 years since I first preached part of a sermon at St George's Tron, my home church in Glasgow. This was part of a Sunday service where the Young Adult Group had been asked to lead worship. I was one of the leaders of the group at the time. After the service, my minister said that I had done well and asked if I had ever considered ministry. I was just about to start my teacher training and so brushed the comment off hastily.

This comment would continue to come up every so often over the next few years. Ministry was something that I was praying about occasionally at the time, but the thought of what it would entail frightened me. It would involve leaving a stable job that I enjoyed, sacrificing a good salary, and having much less certainty about the future.

However, gradually the question of a calling into ministry became something that I couldn't just refuse to explore in good conscience. There were a few key promptings in 2024 that led to me taking the first step; conversations with my minister, lots of prayer, a sermon about exploring God's calling that a friend of mine preached, and a church weekend away exploring how God has uniquely gifted each one of us. So, eventually, I took the first step by contacting the Church of Scotland 'towards ministry' team. Much has happened since then that has led me to believe that God is calling me into ministry. Perhaps most of all has been a sense of peace at the uncertainty of what the future holds, when I would naturally prefer to have a plan.

***What opportunities do you hope your work as a minister might bring to you and your family?***

I am just at the first stages of discerning where and to what type of ministry God may call me to. At the moment, I am very uncertain where I will be in 4 years' time during my first charge (all being well). However, as Yvonne has said to me before, there is a congregation out there somewhere that is waiting for me to serve them. I find it exciting to think that God is forming me during my training into the person I need to be to serve them, even though I don't yet know them!

I am very thankful to Anna for supporting me in my training. It's a very busy time, and she has taken a career break to be there for our sons for the next few years. I have been really encouraged to see how much of a positive influence growing up going to church has had on our sons. Angus is much more confident around adults that I ever was at his age, and it is amazing to see what he is already able to understand about God and the stories from the Bible we read with him. I know that my family will both support me and be a blessing to my ministry in the future.

***Finally, is there anything we, as a congregation, can do to help you with your training?***

The congregation at Bishopton have been so welcoming, and I have felt at home very quickly there. Especially with Yvonne's absence at times over my placement, it is fantastic for me to have such a supportive congregation.

It has been a difficult time for me and my family, with busyness and illness. I really appreciate everyone who has been asking after our family. The most helpful thing people can do is to be praying for me and my family just now. Specifically, for God to be forming me throughout my training and to be protecting our family from further illness. Also, I welcome any feedback from the congregation whilst I am training. Whether positive or negative, big or small, it is really helpful for me to hear.
